# Performing Arts F-6


Ms Mirasgentis announces **The Children's Book Council of Australia** shortlisted books for 2020 and award winners.



The simple tale of One Runaway Rabbit invites us to follow the journey of Lulu, a brazen pet rabbit. Her escape is swift and is driven by her curiosity of the unknown. Then Lulu meets one hungry fox. Lulu's adventures become 'one deadly chase'. Our Foundation and Year 1's adventures became "one deadly chase".









Billy loves dogs. He loves all kinds of dogs but he especially loves Fluff who lives next door with Mrs Banerjee. We are shown the special bond between Billy and Fluff. Billy

For others, they begun to worry and their concerns became louder and louder....."Nothing was ever the same again"






In the story Tilly's

her memory of them. Not all treasures are things or objects.


Students shared the memory of a treasure and created stories about a young girl or boy and how small things we hold dear stay with us always.

What do you think the light housekeeper writes in his logbook? How would the keeper feel during the storm? Think of some ways to show his emotions.

Students in Years 5/ 6 imagined the role of a lighthouse keeper and their logbook entries. Change was on the horizon.....






A story about sharing and making friends.

Squabbles the bat plopped into the tree and used his body language to intimidate the animals. Many questions were posed and then role plays:

What did the bat do with his body?

Use your body to create the same type of body language. How does it make you feel? What type of body language would you use if you were trying to be friendly? How does it make you feel? Do you think it is interesting that so many different types of animals can live together in a tree? What does 'community' mean?

What do you think someone needs to do to be part of a community? Where do Squabbles, Meek and her sisters fly to at the end of the story?



My Friend Fred depicts the unlikely friendship between a playful dachshund named Fred and his feline friend. We see Fred's day unfold through the eyes of the narrator, his best friend 'cat'. This funny story reminds us that our differences make us special and make our friendships interesting and fun!



What other animals could be unlikely friends? Could an elephant be friends with a mouse? We created some stories of unlikely animal combinations. What animals would you choose to be your best friend and why?






