
# **RESERVOIR PRIMARY SCHOOL** NEWSLETTER No. 18 16<sup>th</sup> December 2020








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# When I Grow Up

#### **DISEASE PREVENTION**

Physical activity is ranked second to tabacco control as the most important factor in disease prevention in Australia. Research shows, students who are physically active are healthier, happier and more socially connected.

At Reservoir Primary we support the Bicycle Network's

Ride2School program in a hope that we develop a healthy active travel culture. The Ride 2School program is supported and funded by the Victorian State Government and uses behaviour change methodologies to increase the number of students actively travelling to school all year round.
